President's Message

Doing The Right Thing

Although I usually enjoy Alumni Homecoming Weekend, I must admit this year I was a bit apprehensive as the event approached. This would be the first time alumni would gather at a place now named Burman University.

While nearly all our current and potential students love our new name, some alumni have firmly told me they are not that fond of the Board's choice. Because of this, I braced myself for what I feared might be a weekend of alumni scolding me about our new name.

It turns out my fears were unfounded and you can add one more reason to the long list of reasons why alumni of Canadian Junior College, Canadian Union College, Canadian University College and Burman University are the best alumni in the North American Division: not once was I scolded. It appears our alumni are very practical, pragmatic people who refuse to hold a grudge.



Many times on both Sabbath and Sunday alumni approached me to either say, "I think Burman University was the right choice," or, "At first I was quite upset about the name Burman University, but the more I thought about it, the more I realized it is the right choice for our students as they begin job hunting or applying to graduate school."

Doing the right thing for our students must always be the guiding force in everything we do. Doing the right thing for our students is the reason 151 individuals, a record high, are now members of the *Committee of 100*.

Doing the right thing for our students is why each year donors support existing scholarships and establish new ones. This year they did the right thing for our students in the amount of \$139,000 in scholarship awards.

Doing the right thing for our students is why the Alberta Conference has generously funded not one, but two chaplains for our student body. Doing the right thing for our students is why five professors who retired this year, Denise Herr, Larry Herr, Keith Leavitt, Doug Matacio and Ernest LeVos, spent a combined total of 109 years teaching at Burman University.

Doing the right thing for our students is why our dedicated faculty take the time to mentor them one-on-one. Doing the right thing for our students is why our staff are so gracious and kind even when there are a hundred tasks to juggle and deadlines to meet while wearing multiple job "hats." Doing the right thing for our students, mentally, physically, socially and spiritually guides every decision my administrative team and I make.

It may be that you still do not fully agree with the Board's choice of our new name. I certainly understand and respect your opinion. However, Homecoming Weekend taught me that institutional names don't matter nearly as much to our alumni as does making sure we always do the right thing for our students.

Thank you for encouraging students who are already here and those still making up their mind. Thank you for praying with and for our students. Thank you for helping students financially. You truly are doing the right thing and making a wonderful, positive difference.





Name Change

CUC Changes Status and Official Name to Burman University





CHARLES AND LEONA BURMAN

On December 15, 2014 the Canadian University College Board of Trustees approved changing the institution's name from Canadian University College to Burman University.

The university is named after Charles A. and Leona Burman the husband and wife team who founded the institution in 1907. Charles A. Burman served as the first and third President (Principal) of the school that would be known as Burman University. Leona Burman taught English, Science, Language, Geography, Physiology, and acted as school nurse. Both Charles and Leona devoted their entire lives to service.

"It was because of their selfless dedication and sacrifice that the first school on this hilltop was established," said President Mark Haynal. "In every season of their ministry both of these individuals exemplified the mission of our school. They thought with discernment, believed with insight and commitment, and acted with confidence, compassion and competence."

On July 2, 2014 the Alberta government granted Canadian University College permission to change the institutions status and name from "university college" to "university."

"Referring to ourselves simply as a university will more clearly reflect our degree-granting status and enable our students to pursue graduate school and employment without having to repeatedly explain what a 'university college' is," explains Haynal. "Because 'university college' means markedly different things in different regions, potential students and administrators of post-secondary institutions across Canada and around the world have always been uncertain and often confused by our name."

The name change will lessen the confusion for students as they apply to graduate schools or look for employment. "I have no doubt that the name change from 'university college' to 'university' will help in career searching or pursuing post-graduate education. In Canada especially because we have a difference between universities and colleges in regards to the education provided, applying to jobs or in my case, medical schools, is difficult and confusing because potential schools see the 'college' on my degree. I am thankful for the change in our school's name and I know that it will continue to benefit graduates in the future by making their lives after university less difficult," stated Joshua Perkins a 3rd-year biology major. Theresa Donkor, a 3rd-year business major views the name change as a positive as she plans for future employment. "Changing the name is especially important for graduating students. Becoming a "university" instead of a "university college" will clear up any confusion that other businesses or universities may have. I've often been asked. "How can your school be both a university and a college?" This confusion may hinder us students when faced with future job opportunities or the chance to pursue further education," states Theresa.

The name Burman University was chosen after an intensive process of focus groups held in three regions of Canada. Faculty, staff, students, alumni, friends and citizens of Lacombe joined the process, suggesting more than a hundred possible names.

Full implementation of the new name took place on May 1, 2015. The name change process will be fully complete after petition for amendments through a private bill moves through the Alberta legislature.

I strongly agree that 'university college' in our current name adversely affects students. In my experience as a student, I have often been asked whether I am pursuing a college diploma/certificate or a university degree. The designation 'university college' lowers the university-degree status.

Who were the Burmans?



THE LOGGING CREW LED BY CHARLES AND LEONA BURMAN

"Anyone who desires a thrilling experience to look back upon should pioneer.

The Burmans' entire lives were dedicated to service. The two met at Union College and were married in 1897. Early on in their careers the Burmans were stationed in Alberta where Charles became the first president of the Alberta Conference. Leona also served the Alberta Conference as the Sabbath School Secretary and in the Youth People's Work department.

As Alberta Conference president, Charles urged that building a school would be the best way to inspire colporteurs. This idea gave way to the Canvassers' School that would one day become Burman University. Always working as a team, Leona Burman worked alongside Charles as a staff member at the Canvassers' School.

Only a few months working with the students at the Canvassers' School convinced Charles that a secondary institution was needed. As a team of action, the Burmans, with a logging crew, embarked to gather lumber even before a site or conference approval was granted. Charles led a crew of eighteen men, eighteen horses, three bobsleds, and a cutter to the woods west of Leduc. Leona, with student Hazel Edwards, joined the crew to provide support and cook for the loggers. In three weeks the crew had cut 1,700 logs and piled them on the ice of the North Saskatchewan River.

In 1907 Alberta Industrial Academy was established. The school functioned with four staff members, Charles as the principal and Bible teacher and Leona as the preceptress along with teaching English, Geography, Physiology, and acting as the school nurse.

Charles and Leona Burman cared for not only the academic needs of the AIA students but for their physical needs as well. When seeing student Camille Armeneau canvassing in the cold without a topcoat, Charles took off his and gave it to the student. On another occasion, noticing student Willie McCready's wornout shoes, he bought him a new pair. It was through their tireless service that the students addressed the Burmans as "Ma and Pa Burman."

Leona Burman wrote, "The teacher never gets his reward in the pay envelope, it comes with the years as he watches the students he has taught develop into strong men and women able to carry responsibilities."

This institution was established by the sweat and sacrifice, vision and courage of Charles and Leona Burman who dreamed of a school where men and women would be prepared for lives of service. Their dream lives on in the mission of Burman University, which is to prepare students to think with discernment, to believe with insight and commitment, and to act with confidence, compassion and competence.

The Burman University logo was created following the selection of Burman University as the institution's new name. In keeping with history and tradition, elements from the previous CUC logo were kept and recreated into the current Burman University logo.

The sense of Canada was carried onto the Burman University logo with the colour red and the maple leaf. Not many images say Canada as much as the maple leaf and Canadian Flag.

To invoke the feeling of academia and history the Burman University logo features the Administration Building – one of the most iconic structures on our campus.

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HONORARY ALUMNUS Larry Herr

Larry Herr grew up in the Chicago area, graduating from Broadview Academy in 1965 and Andrews University with a BA in Theology in 1970, taking as many courses at the Seminary from archaeologist Siegfried Horn as he could during his last undergraduate year. After spending a year at the University of Basel in Switzerland to learn German, he enrolled in the PhD program at Harvard University in the Department of Near Eastern Languages and Civilizations, focusing on archaeology. His dissertation was on the development of writing among the small nations of the Holy Land and how those inscriptions could be categorized as national scripts during the time of the Israelite kings of the Old Testament. He also became a specialist in the ways in which pottery changed over time. He graduated in 1977 with a PhD and married Denise Dick a few days later.

the archaeological results of the SDA Heshbon excavations that had just finished in Jordan, Larry and Denise accepted a call to spend six years as missionaries teaching in the Seminary and Graduate School of what is now called the Adventist International Institute of Advanced Studies near Manila, The Philippines. There he taught Old Testament subjects, archaeology, and biblical languages, while organizing the technical record-keeping aspects of the new Adventist archaeological excavations which began near Heshbon in Jordan in 1984. Both

Larry and Denise then received appointments at Burman University (then Canadian Union College) where they began teaching in 1985, elatedly moving from the tropics to Alberta in January. Larry has been known to quip, "Heaven will NOT be tropical!" They immediately felt at home here and have stayed ever since with Larry teaching in the Religious Studies department for 30 years. During that time he has produced 165 peer-reviewed scholarly articles, 18 major books authored or edited, 50 popular articles on archaeology for church magazines, and 17 scholarly book reviews. He has given 86 papers at professional conferences and almost 250 popular lectures in churches, schools and camp meetings. He has taken part in 30 archaeological excavations in Jordan, Israel, and Tunisia, most as Director or Ceramic Consultant. He is a lifetime member of his professional organization, the American Schools of Oriental Research, and has served that organization as the Chair of several committees, on editorial boards, and for 20 years has been the Associate Editor of the Bulletin of the American Schools of Oriental Research, the most prestigious journal in his field. He also served as President of the Canadian wing of that organization for nine years. He plans to work on five more major volumes reporting the SDA excavations in Jordan which he directed between 1984 and 2008. He enjoys several hobbies, such as classical and jazz music, family histories, and outdoor activities.

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




